Participial Phrases

A participle is a verb form that can function as an adjective.

Present participles always end in *-ing*. Although *past* participles often end in *-ed*, they can take other forms as well. Many adjectives commonly used in sentences are actually participles.

The **freezing** rain slowly turned to hail.

The **heated** argument occurred among the**losing** players.

A participle can be used as an adjective or as part of a verb phrase.

PARTICIPLE AS ADJECTIVE PARTICIPLE IN VERB PHRASE

The **married** couple have jobs.
The judge **has married** the couple.

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Participial phrases can be used in various positions in a sentence. They always act as adjectives.

Pete Sampras playing tennis draws large crowds.

Sampras, disappointed with his first serve, vowed to improve his game.

Sitting quietly during one of Sampras's games, his fans watch him intently.

Graciously accepting a trophy from the sponsors, he smiled at the crowd.

In general, a participial phrase at the *beginning* of a sentence is followed by a comma.

Participles evoke action. Add participles to writing by adding —ing verbs to the beginning or end of sentences.

A: The diamond-scaled snakes attacked their prey.

B: Hissing, slithering, and coiling, the diamond-scaled snakes attacked their prey.

Writers may also add participial phrases.

C: Hissing their forked red tongues and coiling their cold bodies, the diamond-scaled snakes attacked their prey.

 Using single participles creates rapid movement, while expanded phrases add details at a slower, but equally intense pace. **A.** I like to savor life, drinking in all of my surroundings...if I were to be running I would miss out on so many little things that I enjoy, they would simply be reduced to an unfair blur.
